The computer program run by SAAS youth with support from the office and board has impacted over 3,000 students since its inception in 2010.

Kenya marks 60th Madaraka Day Celebrations

On June 1, Kenya commemorated 60 years of independence from the British Colonial rule to mark its 60th Madaraka Day. SAAS joined the rest of the world in wishing Kenya a happy 60th Madaraka Day celebration. Madaraka is derived from a Swahili word and translates to self-rule or self-governance.



Madaraka Day is a significant public holiday for Kenya as it

commemorates an important milestone in Kenya's history. It is the day that Kenya attained self-internal rule from British colonial rule in 1963. It is the day that Kenya's founding father and first president, the late Mzee Jomo Kenyatta, hoisted the Kenyan flag, signalling the end of the British colonial era.

Mombasa Hosts World Kiswahili Day

On July 7, 2023, Kenya joined the rest of the world in commemorating the second World Kiswahili Language Day.

Kiswahili is the native language of the Swahili people found primarily in Kenya, Tanzania and Mozambique. The United Nations Educational Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) recognized Kiswahili as one of the ten most spoken languages in the world. About 200 million people in the world speak Kiswahili.

On September 23, 2001, UNESCO declared July 7 the World Kiswahili Language Day. UNESCO declared this during the 41st session of

member states in Paris, France. UNESCO settled for July 7, which is a day that the Tanganyika African National Union (TANU), under the leadership of the first president of Tanzania, the late Mwalimu Julius Nyerere, adopted Kiswahili as a unifying language for independence struggles.

Similarly, the East African Community (EAC) was re-established in 2000 to rekindle

the spirit of cooperation and integration among East African people who speak the Kiswahili language.

Kenya marked World Kiswahili Day with pomp and colour as locals and tourists from all walks of life converged at the main entrance of Fort Jesus, a UNESCO heritage site where the celebrations were held.

Students proceeded for a two-week Easter holiday break from April 22 to May 7, signalling the end of term 1.

Term 2 officially began on May 9 before the students proceeded for a short midterm break from June 29 to July 2.

Term 2 officially ended on August 12, when the students will be home for two weeks before return-

ing to school.

As has been the norm, the office organizes a student holiday revision program. Unfortunately, we couldn't host the program this August holiday due to ongoing renovation work at the office.

Term 3 for the 2023 academic year will officially kick off on August 29 and end in November to pave the way for students in their final year in secondary school to sit their national exams, the Kenya Certificate of Secondary Education (KCSE).
